We thought it important to be a part of his spiritual growth, so decided to transfer to 1st Congregational Church of Westfield. What a wonderful journey it's been watching our grandchildren grow!

I Love this Church! Being a part of this very active and faith filled community has and will continue to bring me joy for many years to come.

 new community. Responsibilities include showing them around their new community, teaching them how to pay bills and identify important mail, how to access public transportation,
 registering them at nearby food pantries and health centers, practicing English with them,
 and being a welcoming friend.
