My father Eric had one sibling, his older brother Maurice. Uncle Maurice and Auntie Marcia had three children, Philip, Jonathon, and Joanna. We lived about 100 miles from them growing up, so didn't see them very often (a few of times a year), but we were close, a similar age spread to my sister Debbie and I, and kept in touch as we grew up. Philip joined the Royal Marines as a bandsman, travelled the world, and played for the Queen on several occasions, eventually studying as a jazz percussionist at Berklee and making a successful career as a session musician. Joanna went to art school, married a chef, and had a family. Jonathon, the middle child, trained to be a printer, married, and emigrated to New Zealand.

Over the years everyone moved around, and I lost direct touch with my cousins, although we knew of each other's progress through life via our parents. When my father passed away, Philip and Joanna were able to come to the funeral, and we reconnected. Meanwhile Jonathon had made a successful career in the printing industry in New Zealand, and had a family.

For my 60th birthday my partner Nevart took us to Australia. While we were planning the trip, we heard on the grapevine that Jonathon and his wife had separated, and Nevart and I decided that we would made a weekend detour to Auckland, the largest city in New Zealand, where Jonathon lived (4 hour flights each way from the nearest point in Australia!). We duly made the detour, and both Jonathon and I wondered privately whether we would recognize each other after 35 years. Of course we did, and Nevart and I had a wonderful few days with him. The intervening years had given us perspective on our childhoods, and Jon and I spent hours discussing the complicated family dynamics (both my father and Maurice were estranged from their father). It was wonderful to reconnect. After a couple of years Jonathon and his girlfriend Jo, who became his wife, came to the UK to celebrate Philip's birthday, we were able to be there also, and Nevart and I planned another trip "down under" to spend a couple of weeks in New Zealand.

Then lightning struck, and not in a good way. Jonathon, who had always been by far the fittest of all the cousins, suffered a seizure which almost killed him, and was subsequently diagnosed with an aggressive and incurable brain tumor. He was not expected to survive more than a year. To make things more difficult, within weeks of his diagnosis COVID halted all travel to and from New Zealand, so Jonathon and his family were not able to get together.

Fast forward to today. Since Jonathon's cancer diagnosis, he had surgery twice and several courses of chemotherapy. A year turned into two, then three, and still he was able to function pretty normally. His doctors were amazed, and he was in the very small percentage of patients with his condition who survived that long. COVID travel restrictions eventually lifted, he was able to make it to the UK with Jo to revisit his childhood haunts and his siblings, and Nevart and I were able to make our delayed visit to New Zealand and spend precious time with him and Jo. Finally, in the last few months his health declined, and he passed away today (Christmas Eve NZ time). I told Jonathon when we visited that he was on our prayer list. He was very touched, and said that he knew others were doing the same thing, and he felt supported and blessed to have so many people thinking of him.

I am very grateful that you have been so generous as to pray for someone with such a tenuous link to our church, and I wanted you to know how much it meant to Jonathon, and of course to me. I believe that it shows the value importance of our love and care for each other, however distant and fleeting our connection.

In accordance with the by-laws of the First Congregational Church, Westfield MA., Article VIII, section 2, The Annual Meeting of the Church shall take place during the month of February upon a date designated by the Church Council. This year's Annual meeting will take place on Sunday, February 9th, 2025 with a snow date of Sunday, February 16th. The meeting will take place following worship service. The reports of all Officers, Committees and affiliated organizations shall be made in writing

and accepted at this meeting. Officers of the Church and Committees shall be elected at this meeting. Nominating Committee shall prepare a ballot nominating one person for each position to be filled at the Annual Meeting of the Church. The right of a member to make nominations from the floor shall always be recognized. This ballot shall be accepted by the church at this meeting. At the Annual Meeting of the Church, the members of the Church will vote on the budget as a single intact entity.
