### Deep In the Heart of Westfield

There are some songs that tend to creep back into our heads. These are called "earworms" as they crawl around in our minds, and we simply can't get them out. Occasionally, one of my earworms is, for some unknown reason, "Deep in the Heart of Texas." So, when this comes around, I have learned to change it to "Deep in the Heart of Westfield." How appropriate for a month when we celebrate Valentine's Day.

Valentine's Day is the day when we celebrate love in all forms. We profess our love for our spouses, significant others, our children, our friends, and even our pets. It is a time when we can profess our love for not only our church, but to celebrate God's unconditional love for all of us. It is also a time for us to re-establish our church as the "Heart of Westfield."

When our church was officially established in 1679, we definitely served as the heart of village. The center of Westfield wasn't exactly where it is today but more towards what we now call East Main Street. According to the charter of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, the village or settlement of Westfield could not exist without the foundation of a church. This church was actually supported by the town; this continued into the early 19<sup>th</sup> century when the laws were changed. As a result, church was the heart and soul of Westfield.

As the town green was established, the church moved to the new "center" of town and was prominent on the green. This is a hallmark of almost every Congregational church in New England. We continue to be in the center of the City of Westfield which, in the last year of the first quarter of the twenty-first century, brings a different flavor to what it means to be the "Heart of Westfield."

Our church continues to welcome various non-profit groups to come in to use our facilities for little cost to us. We practice extravagant hospitality to the Westfield Food Pantry as well as our neighbors as we host the Westfield Food Pantry's Food Truck as well as welcome folks into our building in the winter months. Our church hosted the Ecumenical Thanksgiving Service and the Westfield Historical Society. In the coming months, we will host the Northwest Region of the Southern New England Conference of the United Church of Christ as well as the Young Singers of Greater Westfield.

We need to continue to keep the heart of Westfield beating proudly and strongly. As we once again open our doors to our neighbors, let us be proud to hold our place "Deep in the Heart of Westfield."

### **Special Congregational Meeting**

In accordance with the by-laws of the First Congregational Church, Westfield MA., Article VIII, section 2, The Annual Meeting of the Church shall take place during the month of February upon a date designated by the Church Council. This year's Annual meeting will take place on Sunday, February 9th, 2025 with a snow date of Sunday, February 16th. The meeting will take place following worship service. The reports of all Officers, Committees and affiliated organizations shall be made in writing and accepted at this meeting. Officers of the Church and Committees shall be elected at this meeting. The Nominating Committee shall prepare a ballot nominating one person for each position to be filled at the Annual Meeting of the Church. The right of a member to make nominations from the floor shall always be recognized. This ballot shall be accepted by the church at this meeting. At the Annual Meeting of the Church, the members of the Church will vote on the budget as a single intact entity.

Church Council has recommended changes to the By-laws to be voted at the Annual Meeting.

A Life Worth Living Must Have God as Its Master By Anne Gelinas

So goes what I believe. Ever since my parents brought me to the Congregational Church in Indian Orchard as a child. There I was able to learn ballet and tap dance. I sang in our minstrel shows and choir. I participated in Pilgrim Fellowship with my peers from the neighborhood. I was a Brownie, Girl Scout, and baby sat and peddled papers to help my brother Paul out. I worked on tobacco farms for two summers with my best friend, Carol.

One evening I wanted to take a shortcut through the Catholic cemetery while walking home from peddling papers. It was a leap of faith (perhaps), to walk through the entire cemetery to get to Page Boulevard from Berkshire Street.

The moment I entered, my entire thought was that no one would be walking in the cemetery at the same time. It was already dark. Well, guess what? Along comes a man walking from the opposite direction and my heart raced about what to do. I only knew one thing that would help me at that time. I prayed that Our Lord would walk with me and keep me safe. I prayed no one would speak to me nor walk to me.

In the middle of the cemetery was a statue and a circle. I went to the right and the stranger went to the left. I did not look back. With relief in my heart and mind, I reached Page Boulevard and then looked back. To let God know how thankful I was, I headed to the lake across the street and prayed extremely hard to Jesus for being that stranger and keeping me safe. I tell you, that I did not walk through the cemetery during the night or day again!

I have counted on and believe strongly in my heart and mind that prayer is always the answer. Was I lucky, well you could say that is true, but I was never alone during this walk of faith.

This is just one of many stories that I know God, Jesus, Angels, Saints and Church have stepped in my way to keep me safe so far in my 82 years. I count on this continued support and love and know most people have a story to tell themselves.

I feel blessed every day and am happy to share this story with the members of First Congregational Church who are now a part of my ongoing life story.



### **Property Committee Bylaw Change**

The Property Committee completed Roy Bascom's performance appraisal in November. Roy had one request under "Employee Comments". He asked to consider changing his title from "Custodian" to "Church Sexton" and backed his request with information on the use of the title Sexton.

The Property Committee discussed his request at our December meeting. Webster's defines "Sexton" as a "church officer or employee who takes care of the church property...". A Sexton's duties go beyond custodial cleaning. It includes church safety and security and care of the church property.

The Property Committee approved Roy's request and it was presented and approved at the December Church Council meeting. This will require minor wording change to Article V1 Section 19 of the Bylaws. Where the word "Custodian" appears, it will be changed to "Church Sexton". This will be addressed at our Feb 9th annual meeting.

## **Church Security on Sundays** and **Special Services**

The Academy St. doors are unlocked 45 minutes before the start of the service (8:45 AM Sundays). The Broad St. front entry is unlocked 20 minutes before the start of the service (9:10 AM Sundays). The Academy St. doors are locked 15 minutes after the start of the service (9:45 AM on Sundays) while the front entry remains open during the service. The front entry door is locked 10 minutes following the end of worship (or when most people have left the sanctuary) so please use an alternate exit after coffee hour.
