- Palm Sunday/Passion Sunday on April 13 at both churches (9:30 FCC/11:00 SCC)
- Maundy Thursday at Southwick Congregational Church at 7:30 PM
- Easter Sunday on April 20 at both churches (9:30 FCC/11:00 SCC)
- Joint Service on April 27 at Southwick Congregational at 11:00 AM

I know of folks who enjoy the simple but majestic entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem. For some, it is the beauty and time-honored ritual of the Maundy Thursday Service. Deacons Corner

In addition to working at Blessed Buys, two other passions of mine are researching genealogy and cleaning old gravestones. I have been able to combine these two loves with a greater project which may take the rest of my life. As a member of the Westfield Historical Commission, I learned how to properly clean gravestones without damaging the stones or the earth on which they stand. One of our WHC missions is to preserve Westfield's Old Burying Ground on Mechanic Street which includes two community stone cleaning days each year. The stones there date back to the 1700s and 1800s, with a few from the 1600s. As the 2-3 centuries of accumulated dirt and fungus growth wash away, amazing previously illegible stories carved on the stones emerge. The strength and fortitude it took to survive in those early years is something we cannot begin to imagine. I genuinely love cleaning old gravestones, and my husband is an expert at straightening and repairing leaning or broken stones. We are happy to be of assistance if you have an old stone in need of TLC.

In researching our family genealogy, my brother and I have discovered exciting facts. First, looking at both my mother's side and my father's, we found we are related to 8 of the original 51 Pilgrims who survived the first winter in Plymouth. I believe about 30,000,000 Americans can also make that claim, so we are not that unique, but it is still thrilling to know that if those hearty souls had not survived, my family would not exist. We also uncovered other tales from our past such as our 8th great grandfather, Ebenezer Hall, was scalped by Native Americans on Matinicus Island, Maine when he trespassed one too many times on their land. Luckily for us, his daughter, Suzannah, our 7th great grandmother, had already moved to the mainland, married and started a family. A third find was that although we had 12 ancestors fight bravely as Patriots in the American Revolution, we had a 13th ancestor who was a Loyalist, was arrested for being a British spy, and hanged in 1777. Finally, our great grandfather, Albert Cotton, was killed in an explosion on Governor's Island in 1902 in a blast that rocked all of Boston. Again, luckily my grandmother had already been born. The stories just keep on coming as we dig deeper!

Many of our ancestors eventually left Plymouth to travel north and settle all along the coast of Maine. The project I mentioned earlier is to find their burial plots and clean their stones, which I began in 2022. That trip included visiting Owl's Head, Rockland, Camden, Damariscotta, Nobleboro, Vassalboro, Waldoboro, and Phippsburg. It was truly thrilling to first, find the many tiny cemeteries, and then the stones of my ancestors, many so covered in years of grime, they were unreadable. To see their names appear as the water washed away the dirt filled me with incredible joy and sense of satisfaction. I was saying to them, thanks to you, I am here, and you have not been forgotten.

I am proud to say we come from a long line of Congregationalists, including three Congrega-

tional ministers, my father, grandfather, and great grandfather. The list of Pilgrims we are related to includes the last names: Alden, Mullins, Standish, Rogers, Warren, Sampson, and Brewster. Do I have any long-lost cousins art First Church?


