A Note or Two from the Bell Choir by Deb Alm

COVID posed many challenges to communities eager to gather in close proximity, and at First Church, of Westfield the loss of a regular choir on Sunday mornings was deeply felt by both the singers and the congregation. One positive outcome was the rebirth of the Handbell Choir.

I have deep connections to handbells. At one time, my grandmother worked at the White-chapel Bell Foundry in London, which has been crafting handbells since 1740. The church I attended as a youth in New Hackensack, NY received a gift of four octaves of Whitechapel handbells when I was a high school student and the church supported three excellent bell choirs. My only true stint as a ringer, however, was at a summer church music camp some 50+ years ago, but when asked to play at First Church, I was eager to join.

Allan Taylor was gracious to share some historical information regarding the bells you hear on Sunday mornings, and I am happy to share some of this with you. Longtime members of our congregation may be familiar with this story. According to Allan, the donor of the bells was Bob Arnold, a former choir member. His wife had died, and a few months later, he approached Allan about donating a set of handbells. The initial purchase was a three-octave set of Schumelrich bells, with cases, tables, pads, and folders. This was somewhere in the early 1990's. With his budgeted \$1000 a year, Allan was able to acquire sheet music, and later, when Bob Arnold offered to expand the set to four octaves, more tables and equipment were added.

The choir consisted of some senior choir members, high school aged players and non-choir members. As playing bells is not as easy as it looks, there was some turnover, but the handbell choir persisted with Allan directing. Change happens in all churches, and First Church, Westfield is no exception. When Allan left the church briefly in 2001, the handbells went silent until Covid inspired the movement to play again, behind masks where we felt safe. The overwhelmingly positive response from the congregation meant that the bell choir would regularly contribute to the music ministry.

These days, 11 members (and a substitute) gather weekly at 8am on Sunday mornings, slip on our gloves to protect the metal of the bells from the sweat of our hands, turn on the lights over our music stands, and—in the words of Martha Roman—count or die. Unlike choral singing where a section is singing in unison, each member of the bell choir is a soloist, responsible for 2-4 or more notes on the score. Variations in the technique of ringing that add color and interest to the piece is notated in our scores. As previously mentioned, bell ringing is not as easy as it looks, but ask any of us, and we will unanimously agree that being involved in this community of musicians contributing to the very special musical dimension of First Church of Westfield is so rewarding.

And in answer to that burning question, "What do you call a member of the bell choir?" It is not "ding-a-ling". Ringer will suffice.

Late March through April has been an exciting time for Church School participants!


