Happy Birthday! Pentecost has also been called the Birthday of the Church. Happy Summer! We also have the promise of warmer weather and summer activities ahead of us. But let's talk about the Holy Spirit.

While people had been gathering together and sharing the Good News of Christ crucified and risen from the dead, it was truly the Pentecost event that signaled the "birth" as Holy Spirit was truly with the Apostles and disciples of Jesus. Acts 2 tells us:

It was early winter in 2021 with the ground frozen and snow patches all around. Don, my future husband, has come for supper at my home. Afterwards, as usual we played "Rummy" as well as watched "The Wheel of Fortune and Jeopardy. It was now dark when Don headed home to Feeding Hills and as he went out the Kitchen door there was such a loud pounding sound of fluttering wing feathers. There was a large brown bird departing its perch from my tall flower pot next to the porch. We were very

surprised by the size of this bird and later identified it as a Bard Owl. We surmised it was after birds, mice and other critters that visited my feeders. Now, each night, Don would look out the door to see if the owl was there on my flower pot before he ventured out the door to go home. This Bard Owl came almost every night for approximately ten days. Then one night we looked out but he wasn't there but, as we entered the porch, there was the huge brown owl lying on the ground. I called to my grandson, Nathan, to come and help us. He brought a towel and wrapped the owl in it. Nathan then said, Gramma, the owl is just "feathers and bones". We felt very sad as we realized it had starved to death. If only I had known, I would have brought some hamburg or other food to feed it. Anyway, Nathan and I took the owl to the woods next to the house and parted the brush and leaves to hide it under it all.

Soon after, I read articles about owls not having enough rodents in the wild to feed on. This season many had been found and brought to sites where people were caring for the owls. This owl's death left us with an empty feeling as we could have perhaps helped it if we had known the situation

Spring came and one day I noticed something yellow in the woods right where we had laid the owl to rest. It was a lovely clump of daffodils, I had not planted them there. Don and I

were puzzled by this and both of us agreed GOD must have put them there. Each year since, we would look for the daffodils to appear and we were never disappointed. It soon became time for us to purchase a cemetery stone and when we did, we decided to have a Bard Owl carving on it as well as daffodils to remind us of a time when GOD touched our lives.
