I memorized this for my college class in Public Speaking. It is timeless and shapes much of what I live by. It was given to me by a classmate Sally Heggie Copeland many years ago.

Go placidly amid the noise and the haste and learn what peace there may be in silence. Speak your truth quietly and clearly, and listen to others, even the dull and the ignorant; they too have their story...if you compare yourself with others you may become vain and bitter, for always there will be greater and lesser persons than yourself.

Enjoy your achievements as well as your plans. Keep interested in your career, however humble; it is a real possession in the changing fortunes of time. Exercise caution in your business affairs...but let this not blind you to what virtue there is; many persons strive for high ideals and everywhere life is full of heroism.

Be yourself. Especially do not feign affection. Neither be cynical about love; for in the face of all aridity and disenchantment it is as perennial as the grass. Take kindly the counsel of the years, gracefully surrendering the things of youth. Do not distress yourself with imaginings. Many fears are born of fatigue and loneliness.

Be gentle with yourself. You are a child of the universe no less than the trees and the stars; you have a right to be here...And whether it is clear to you or not, no doubt the universe is unfolding as it should.

Therefore be at peace with God, whatever you conceive him to be. And whatever your aspirations in the noisy confusion of life, keep peace within your soul. With all its shame, drudgery and broken dreams, it is still a beautiful world.

From the Property Committee: <u>Tower Clocks</u>

You might have noticed that our church's four clocks had been showing four different times for many months – three close to accurate and one on its own time. Property Committee member Allan Taylor has been working with a friend who has experience with clocks like ours. They are diagnosing the malfunction(s) and have reset the north, south and west clocks to the correct time and are monitoring them for time drift. The hands of the east clock were recently fixed at 12 o'clock and the motor was removed for inspec-

tion. Our clocks were installed in

1996 and all four motors were replaced in 2001. While the three functioning clocks have been keeping reasonably accurate time since being reset, the motors have exceeded their life expectancy, and we anticipate all four may need to be replaced. Further, the hand drives need maintenance. As testing continues and more information becomes available, Allan will be developing recommendations and cost estimates.
